






The majority of student parents are students of color




Most student parents are married, but women are almost 3x as likely as men to be single parents





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
Student parents are more likely to live in rural and inland regions







Most student parents have a child under six years old









The majority of student parents are first-generation students


Two-thirds of student parents attend the state's community colleges, while few attend its public universities








Almost two out of three student parents delayed their enrollment in college at least one year.



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Few student parents enroll full time for the full year, which delays and jeopardizes completion.




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Student parents are more likely to balance fulltime work with school

57% of nonparenting students received a Pell Grant






Student parents are more likely to receive public benefits






The Need for AB 2458, the GAINS for Student Parents Act

- The **cost of college**, including childcare, is one of student parents' biggest barriers.
- Student parents have **additional childcare expenses**, which are not accounted for in the college's cost of attendance (COA) budgets.
- Federal regulations allow financial aid administrators to **adjust a student's COA to include dependent care expenses**, however, institutions often do not take full advantage. Instead, students are forced to individually request a "**dependent care allowance**", if they even know this is an option.
- In some cases, student parents may be asked to **provide further proof of their dependent care costs** or be incorrectly denied adjustments.
- This process is not well understood nor consistently applied, resulting in **unnecessary burdens on students and financial aid administrators**.
- The U.S. Government Accountability Office found that student parents are not maximizing their federal financial aid.



Cost of Attendance (COA) Adjustments

Instructions

- 1. Find your campus' financial aid cost of attendance adjustment website.
- 2. Find the COA adjustment form.
 - a. If it doesn't mention dependent care allowance (DCA), find the DCA form.
- 3. Review the Dependent Care Allowance instructions.
 - a. What does a student need to do to complete the process?
 - b. What barriers are there to obtaining this information?
- 4. Find the section of the COA form that covers medical expenses.
 - a. What medical expenses might pregnant or parenting students have?
